
# LUXEMBOURG, CANDIDATE TO UNESCO'S EXECUTIVE BOARD FOR 2025-2029

### Information and Communication

Luxembourg has supported UNESCO's International Programme for the Development of Communication for many years and was elected to its Intergovernmental Council for 2023-2027. Luxembourg is committed to the safety of journalists and media professionalswith a focus on women, who are particularly vulnerable as well as to the fight against dis- and misinformation, an essential prerequisite for a healthy Democracy.

#### Science

Universal access to science is a prerequisite for the scientific advances that humanity so urgently needs. It is crucial to take into account the the voices of women, LGBTI+ people and all those in vulnerable situations. The climate crisis, which particularly affects Small Island Developing States, must be tackled on the basis of facts and science. Luxembourg highlights the role of biospheres in the fight to protect the environment and biodiversity.

UNESCO cannot avoid in-depth reflection on **social transformations**. Luxembourg contributes to this effort through its **commitment to MOST** and active contributions to the work of the Intergovernmental **Bioethics** Committee.
